#### Ukraine

The ongoing situation in Ukraine is deeply distressing for us all. Following on from my e mail to parents last week, I wanted to share some resources to support conversations you may be having with your children. Even if your child is not watching the news, they may still hear about these events in other ways, and this may cause anxiety for them.

Children in Years 3-6 regularly watch BBC Newsround during the week. This is specifically targeted at children and I would recommend this as a means for children keeping up to date with world events generally. We are also discussing events and having a regular time for reflection in our assemblies. Clearly, there is a strong link to our school value for this half term, which is peace. Staff will respond calmly to any specific questions from children, and in an age appropriate manner.

I know from speaking to parents that many in our school and community are directly affected and have families or roots in the region. Please do not hesitate to contact the school if you feel your child or family are particularly being impacted by events in Ukraine, so that we can look to provide support.

#### **COVID-** a reminder

We are continuing to follow advice from the Haringey Public Health team.

We are continuing to:

Ensure good hygiene for everyone.

- Maintain appropriate cleaning regimes.
- Keep occupied spaces well ventilated.
- Follow public health advice on testing, selfisolation and managing confirmed cases of COVID-19 (see below)

Pupils, staff and other adults should continue to selfisolate when required to do so.

- They should not come into school if they have symptoms, have had a positive test result or other reasons requiring them to stay at home due to the risk of them passing on COVID-19 (for example, they are required to quarantine).
- If anyone in school develops COVID-19 symptoms, however mild, they should be sent them home and they should follow public health advice.
- If a staff member or a child experiences a fever, a cough or a loss of sense of smell/taste then they should self-isolate and book a PCR test.
- If a staff member or a child experiences wider symptoms of COVID-19 (sore throat, headache, runny nose, headache, excessive sneezing) then they should take a lateral flow test before returning to school.
- This testing requirement will be reviewed when access to free testing is ended nationally on the 1st April.

# Information for parents and carers on COVID-19 vaccination for at risk 5 to 11 year olds

I have been asked to share the following information with parents by the DfE.

Children aged 5 to 11 years who are in a clinical risk group or who live with someone immunosuppressed can get the COVID-19 vaccine, in line with advice set out by the Joint Committee on

Vaccination and Immunisation (JCVI). Eligible with children include those diabetes. immunosuppression, learning disabilities, and other conditions as outlined by the UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA) in the Green Book.

Vaccinations help to increase protection against COVID-19, which is particularly important for those with underlying health conditions.

Further information is available in the guide for parents of children aged 5 to 11 years published by UKHSA. We have published some frequently asked questions on the vaccination programme including information on eligibility, accessibility and advice for parents of children at high risk from COVID-19.

Following <u>advice</u> from the JCVI, healthy 5 to 11 year old children will also be offered two 10 microgram doses of the COVID-19 vaccine. The NHS will prepare to extend this non-urgent offer to all children during April.

# Thank you parents and carers!

Parents' consultation meetings for the main school are continuing via SchoolCloud this evening.

Prior to these consultations, we sent all the children's books home for a weekend, to enable these to be reviewed prior to the virtual meetings with teachers. As these are such a vital record of the children's learning, this was done with a certain level of trepidation! However, I would like to thank everyone for their support in all books for every child being back at school on the Monday morning, so there was no disruption to learning. **Thank you!** 

As has already been shared, meetings for parents of children in Nursery have been postponed due to staff absences, and will be rescheduled in due course.

#### Ofsted

In March 2015, St. Aidan's was inspected by Ofsted and received an outstanding judgement. In November 2019, we then had a subject specific inspection which looked at the teaching of history. Since then, we have continued to evolve our practice and offer to the children.

After a period of being exempt from inspection due to this grading, all schools previously judged as outstanding are now due inspections by August 2025.

Since our last inspection, the framework under which schools are inspected has changed. Under the current framework, it has become increasingly difficult for schools that were previously judged as outstanding to retain this judgement. Between September and November last year, 74% of 'outstanding' schools inspected were now found to be 'good'. This trend has certainly continued since then. Ofsted have been clear that it does not mean that those schools have declined in recent years; rather, it is because those schools are now being judged under a different framework.

All staff at St. Aidan's continue to have high expectations for all children and are continuing to ensure that children experience an excellent offer every day.

# Do you know the school's governors?

#### Fr Patrick Henderson: Foundation governor

Father Patrick has been the priest at Holy Trinity Church since 2002 and a foundation governor at St Aidan's for 19 years. He is also a part-time chaplain at the local Church of England secondary school, Greig City Academy, and works with Fr. Ben in the parish of Holy Innocents, Hornsey. He was Chair of Governors for a number of years at a VA Church of England primary school in a previous parish.

He sits on the Care and Communications Committee at St. Aidan's and he is the link governor for RE. What he particularly enjoys about his work with St. Aidan's is his involvement with the children. This includes leading the KS2 clergy assemblies on Monday afternoons, visiting classes during Faith Week and, in normal times, welcoming the children to the church for their RE visits and school services at Harvest, Christmas, Easter and at the end of the summer term.

Fr Ben has been a governor for four years, since becoming Vicar of Holy Innocents in Hornsey. On the governing body he sits on the resources committee and the pay committee. He is also the link governor for Modern Foreign Languages - he is an Italian speaker, and in a previous life spent six years as an English teacher in Italy. He gives regular assemblies in the school, and really enjoys interacting with the students on a whole ranges of religious and philosophical topics. He particularly enjoyed the training the school offered in philosophy for kids. He also works with St Mary's School in Hornsey.

# Anchor project research project

At St. Aidan's, we have been using the Anchor Approach to support the wellbeing of children, parents and staff. I have been approached by a team at UCL who are conducting research into its impact.

The Anchor Approach resilience (https://www.haringey.gov.uk/social-care-and-health/health/public-health/haringey-anchor-approach) is being run at your child's school, and the impact of this intervention is currently being evaluated by researchers from University College London. We are particular interested in your views as a parent, for example, whether you are aware of the Anchor Approach and what you think of it. This research will help to further strengthen the Anchor Approach, and its outcomes on your child's well-being.

We are organising one-hour long focus groups in order to hear your feedback. If you are interested in finding out more about the research or would like to participate, please identify your interest using the link in this letter by **March 25th**.

#### Spend Requests

Agreed spend for Red class toilet refurb today, with a view to reviewing works on Orange & Yellow class toilets imminently. Funding of curriculum-based items as per the breakdown in a recent letter to parents. Survey responses met with a resounding 'yes' to using PSA funds to pay for the following items:

- Target tracker subscription-£1269.75 this is a platform used to track pupil attainment and progress across the school. Class teachers upload data about each child on a regular basis. The platform allows us to interrogate the data, looking for possible trends, and track the progress of groups of pupils.
- Mathematics Mastery subscription-£2565 we use Mathematic Mastery to deliver maths teaching across the school. Our annual subscription provides materials which teachers use on a daily basis to deliver lessons to their classes and ensure that we have a well-sequenced and interlinked Early Years, KS1 and KS2 curriculum. The subscription also enables us to access training and professional development, to ensure all staff keep up to date with the delivery of this core subject, as well as updates for the maths subject leader.
- Islington Education Library Service-£1410 we use the Islington Education Library Service to supplement our curriculum offer with a range of artefacts. Teachers can order boxes related to a subject they are teaching, with the librarians then making up a bespoke box of resources to support teaching. For example, history teaching may be supported by a box containing costumes, artefacts and relevant books.
- ICT support, £5148 our subscription to our ICT technician ensures that any issues with our ICT infrastructure are addressed in a timely manner. We all appreciate the frustrations and challenges of working with ICT when things go wrong! This support means that a weekly half day visit from a technician, specialising in schools' ICT support, keeps our systems and hardware running smoothly and allows any issues to be addressed in a timely manner
